
THE LEAGUE OF EXTRAORDINARY WOMEN

bookcase when she was growing up. "What you read is
important because it shapes your mind and builds your
character," says entrepreneur, author, lecturer and founder
of Akaasa. In fact, Angela creshts these great men for
developing her passion for human rights. When she was
22 years old, Angela was the youngest elected Board of
Governor of Amnesty International Malaysia.

Today, however, Angela shares that she has chosen to stand independent with Akassa, a non-profit consultancy and communications organisation. Through Akassa, she balances the fine line between social work and business sustainability by providing companies with strategies with a social purpose and conscience.

Aside from Akasaa, Angela also extends pro-bono consultation on human rights and refugee issues to the Malaysian Social Research Institute (MSRI). She is currently working with an Iraqi refugee under the Awake Minds Mentorship, helping her to learn new skills for business and overcome the mental challenges of being a refugee. "Over the past two years, MSRI and I have been working to set up the first women's co-op for Middle Eastern refugees. My focus was to help them build a market for their products and transfer business knowledge and skills for them to sustain the co-operative in the long run," she says.

Angela considers giving back to society and helping those in need a duty of utmost importance. It reaffirms her sense of humanity. "Most people live in a vacuum of self-importance. It's about the things we have, the things we don't have the things we wish we have. Leave all that behind and understand that life is bigure than just us."
